# HOW WE ARE FIGHTING THE DISEASE OF HIV/AIDS

It is more than 40 years since the news came that the world was experiencing a great public health challenge that was threatening the existence of mankind. Governments, Civil Societies, and Churches came together to warn the people. Communities were mobilized, schools and churches became centers of education on how the HIV and AIDS war could be tackled. The African continent in particular faced obliteration. Millions were infected and millions more died.

Africa was hit the hardest because the epidemic took advantage of its resource-limited health infrastructure and scarce finances.

That is not the case today. The sadness and panic that HIV/AIDS brought have been replaced by hope and optimism. The worst is behind us. The discovery of anti-retroviral medications has helped the infected lead normal and healthy lives. A wide variety of preventive and coping measures have also helped mitigate the impact of this disease. Even so, the war has not been truly won yet. We must remain focused.

The Seventh-day Adventist Church in collaboration with Sub-Saharan African Youth & Family Services in Minnesota (SAYFSM) here in Minnesota has taken educating our communities a notch higher. We believe that people must continually be told where the danger lies and how to join the journey to victory. We are determined that by the year 2030 AIDS will be eliminated from the world. For that to happen, we must continue making sure that the more than 6000 infections that happen every day across the world do not occur among our people.

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We are taking responsibility, according to Nana Poku of the Health Economics and AIDS Research Division (HEARD) of the University of Kwazulu Natal in South

Africa. "The only viable way we can reenergize the war on HIV and AIDS is by funding and supporting culturally sensitive programs that are conducted by locals who understand the language and practices of that community.

Research has shown that such interventions are not only effective but also not as expensive. Therefore, there is a need to make them a permanent feature rather than a small component of HIV & AIDS intervention method."

United Central and the Mountain Experience SDA Churches in Minneapolis, Minnesota have been providing culturally and linguistically appropriate health education to the church community. Twice a month per church we cover HIV and AIDS-related topics. Since we are still meeting in person and on YouTube, we believe we are reaching a wider audience with an average of 50 people in attendance and over 300 views per week. We have covered the causes of HIV and AIDS, prevalence, prevention mitigating measures, and stigma related issues. We are encouraging people to be faithful to one sex partner and to use protection all the time when engaging in sex.

The importance of knowing one's HIV status is emphasized, and the advantages of faithfully taking anti-retroviral medication are reiterated. We are also encouraging people to HIV self-test (HIVST). The self-test is an empowering process in which an individual performs an HIV rapid diagnostic test and interprets the result in private. This is an excellent way for an individual to know their status without having it on record.

This programming has not been without challenges. We have a mixed congregation of children and parents and parent in-laws, and speaking about sex and protective equipment like condoms sometimes can be a little unsettling. But we soldier on knowing that this has worked in the past and it continues to be effective. We recommend what SAYFSM and other stakeholders should do to improve HIV/AIDS awareness among

## Let's Fight HIV not those living with HIV

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People don't want to know if they have HIV, because they are afraid their family and community will judge and reject them. Everyone needs to know they will always be loved and supported even if they have HIV/AIDS.

The virus that causes AIDS is not spread through touch, saliva, tears, sneezing, coughing, or any type of casual contact. HIV is spread mainly through exposure to semen, vaginal fluid, anal fluid, blood, or breast milk from a person who is HIV positive.

## What do you need to know about HIV?

### WHAT IS HIV/AIDS?

- HIV is the virus that causes AIDS. It damages the immune system, which is the body's natural defense mechanism that protects our bodies from diseases and infections.
- After being infected, you can live for several years without having symptoms or knowing you have HIV and can pass it on to others.
- After being infected with HIV for several years, your immune system is severely damaged and your infection progresses to AIDS.
- AIDS is the last stage of HIV.
- Only a doctor can diagnose AIDS.
- There is no vaccine or cure for HIV/AIDS.
- Treatment is available to help most people with HIV infection to live healthy and longer lives, even though they can still pass HIV on to others if protection is not used or they share needles.
- In order to benefit from treatments, knowing your HIV status early is crucial. You can know the status of your HIV only by getting tested for HIV.
